- Speaker must come to the microphone and identify himself/herself.

AFT Connecticut Sixty-sixth Annual Business Convention Saturday, May 18, 2013—The Aquaturf

Melodie Peters, AFT Connecticut President, John Olsen, CT State AFL-CIO President, Lt Governor Nancy Wyman, and AFT NE Regional Director Mark Bostik greeted delegates and welcomed them to the convention.

President Peters called the AFT Connecticut Business Convention to order at 10:15 a.m.

Ron Greenier, Chair of the Credentials Committee reported that the credentials for delegates from West Haven and Newtown Federation of Teachers and L&M RNs were received after the deadline. M/S/V to seat those delegates. With those locals, this convention represents 22 locals of 83 with a combined voting strength of 19,346. Therefore we have a quorum. M/S/V to accept Credentials Committee report.

M/S/V to accept the Minutes of 65th Convention

As a Special Order of Business, President Melodie Peters recognized the service of John Altieri, Leo Canty, Betty Gadson, and Phyllis Kornfeld, all of whom are not seeking reelection, and presented them with a gift on behalf of AFT Connecticut.

Jan Hochadel, Chair of the Ad Hoc Committee on Executive Council, reported on the actions of the committee to date. She encouraged everyone to respond to the request for suggestions on how to reenergize the Executive Council meetings.

Throughout the morning, delegates heard from a number of speakers on why It Takes A Union—Erin Benham, Shellye Davis, Jan Hochadel, Harry Rodriguez, and Dennis Bogusky.

Phyllis Kornfeld, Chair of Amendments Committee referred delegates to the prepared written report:

ARTICLE VIII - REVENUES

Section 1

a. On or before the fifteenth of each month each affiliated local shall pay to the Secretary-Treasurer of the AFT, the AFT dues, AFT Connecticut dues, and the State AFL-CIO dues.



b. The AFT Connecticut Dues Structure shall be as follows:

Full Dues:	members with an annual salary of over \$20,000 25,000
Two-thirds Dues:	members with an annual salary between \$16,000 to \$20,000 and \$25,000
One-half Dues:	members with an annual salary of less than \$16,000 between \$12,000 and \$20,000, agency fee payers who are represented by another bargaining unit, and members at large
One-quarter Dues:	workers earning less than \$8,000 12,000 per year, laid off workers, workers on non-paid leave
Retirees:	\$6.00 per member per year

The committee (unanimously) recommends concurrence.

M/S/V to accept committee recommendation.

ARTICLE VIII – REVENUES, Section 1 add new section (c):

c. The threshold for Full, Two-thirds, One-half, and One-quarter dues shall rise one percent (1%) per year, unless otherwise amended at the Business Convention.

The committee (unanimously) recommends concurrence.

M/S/V to accept committee recommendation.

Chuck Morrell reported for the Resolutions Committee and presented the following resolution for consideration:

Gun Safety/Workplace/School Safety

WHEREAS the recent tragedies at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, CT; Movie Cineplex in Aurora, Colorado; as well as those that preceded these events with the violent loss of innocent lives, we are called to action to address the rising tide of violence in our schools, hospitals, and work places.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that AFT Connecticut will work to:

- Support legislators at the local, state and federal levels to close loopholes surrounding the sales of guns, including but not limited to mandatory universal background checks for all type of sales, e.g. retail, wholesale, and gun shows as well as private and internet sales.
- Support the creation of a national database of gun sales to track all sales and gun ownership which is consistent with current Connecticut law.
- Support enhanced School Resource Officer Programs for all schools, as well as other types of programs that are designed to increase safety in the work place.
- Support the development of a professional educational program, centered on "Active Threat" training similar to the lockdown procedures already in place in many school districts, and encourage the expansion of these programs to include the workplaces of all our members.
- Advocate for reforms in the mental health system to include increased early intervention and access to crucial support programs, the development of policy and procedure for the identification of "an individual of concern," and improved access to direct services when needed, so that we as a community can better reach out to those people in need of mental health services.

M/S/V to adopt the resolution.



M/S/V to allow consideration of a resolution submitted by Danbury Nurses Union Local 5047. A motion was made and seconded to adopt the resolution; following discussion, the motion failed.

Lobbyist Jennifer Berigan reported on the status of legislation we've been following. She told the delegates to keep up the work, the fight. It takes a union to have a voice and a voice is what's needed right now.

M/S/V to recess to Jurisdictional Caucus meetings.

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Requirements for Commissioner of Education

Whereas anyone seeking employment as a teacher in the State of Connecticut must hold a valid certificate issued by the Connecticut State Department of Education;

Whereas Section 10-145b of the Connecticut General Statutes outlines the requirements for educators to progress from initial educator to professional educator, which includes minimum years of actual classroom experience;

Whereas individuals seeking an 092 endorsement in administration must complete a minimum of 50 months of teaching experience and 18 graduate semester hours beyond a Master's degree;

Whereas individuals seeking an 093 endorsement for superintendent, must complete 80 months of teaching experience, including 30 months of full-time administrative or supervisory experience and 30 graduate hours beyond the Master's degree;

Whereas the Commissioner of Education, with the advice and consent of the General Assembly, develops, directs and implements education policy and public school instruction in Connecticut;

Whereas qualified, certified educators deliver the highest quality instruction and have the greatest impact on student learning;

Whereas all educators in the state are under increased scrutiny and accountability from legislators, boards of education, the media and the general public;

Be it therefore resolved that AFT Connecticut will advocate for policy and/or legislation that outlines mandates minimum educational and classroom experience for the State Commissioner of Education to include at least the same requirements as any individual serving as a superintendent in Connecticut must have; an 093 endorsement.
